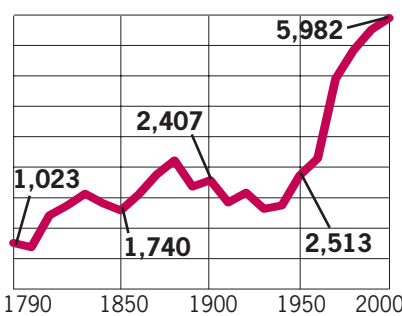

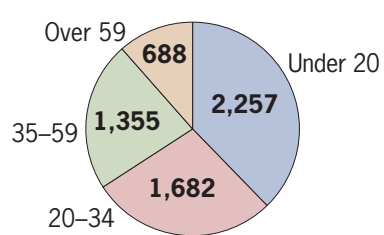

Did you know?:

- John Adams is said to have spent the night in Kemp's Tavern, a Maxatawny Township inn a mile east of Kutztown.
- It is believed Count Zinzendorf, a Moravian minister, preached to settlers in 1742 from the balcony of Levan's Mill, near Eagle Point.
- The Centennial White Oak of Pennsylvania or Mammoth White Oak of Berks was located on the farm of J. Bieber Jr. The oak lived for more than two centuries.

Region had farms, mills, factories

Sitting on the northeastern boundary of Berks County along the Lehigh County border is Maxatawny Township, home to rolling farmland and several small towns.

The township's first known inhabitants were the Lenni Lenape Indians. When Europeans arrived in the mid-1700s, some Lenni Lenape stayed in Maxatawny, even after others in their nation had left the county.

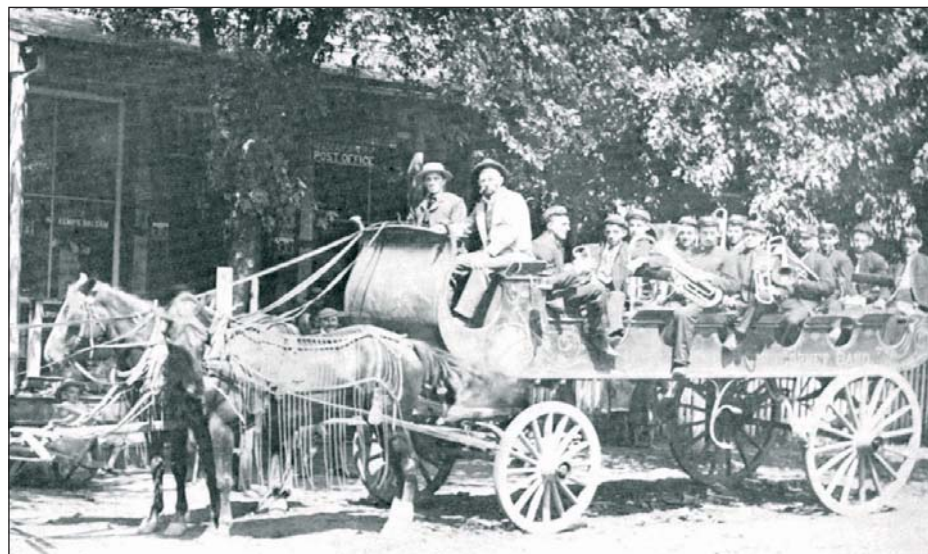
Most of the early immigrants were farmers; some became manufacturers of tools used in the home and on the farm. On the Saucony Creek others built grist, saw and clover mills and gun-barrel factories.

During the Revolutionary War, soldiers camped in Maxatawny Township between the residence of John Kemp Esq. and the farm of Daniel Zimmerman. George Washington and his wife, Martha reportedly accompanied the soldiers and lodged in the home of Joseph Gross.

Maxatawny, the largest village in the township, was called Rothrockville for the first 90 years of its existence.

The village was named for Dr. Jonas G. Rothrock, who came to the area from Macungie and purchased four tracts of land. He acquired the first tract in 1829 for \$621 in gold and silver. Soon after buying the land, Rothrock established a public house where he also practiced medicine and served as justice of the peace.

Rothrock acquired more land and even built another public house, but he was a poor business manager and could

not keep his creditors at bay. In 1846 one of the hotels he owned was sold at sheriff's sale to Jesse Grim.

Kutztown University is in Maxatawny Township on the edge of the borough of Kutztown. The school was established in 1835-36 as a prep school called the Franklin Academy. In 1860 it became Fairview Seminary, in 1863 Kutztown Seminary and then in 1864 Maxatawny Seminary.

In 1866 it became Keystone State Normal School; in 1928 it was designated

Kutztown State Teachers College. The school became Kutztown State College in 1960 and in 1983 the name changed yet again, this time to Kutztown University.

Today, it is one of the 14 public institutions of the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education and has about 8,000 students.

As the university and the surrounding area attract modern settlers, the population of Maxatawny is growing, and cows and tract homes now share the same landscape.
